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### Introduction

The purpose of conducting a community health needs assessment is to describe the health of local people, identify use of local health care services, identify and prioritize community needs and identify action needed to address the future delivery of health care in the defined area. A health needs assessment benefits the community by: 1) collecting timely input from the local community, providers and staff; 2) providing an analysis of secondary data related to health conditions, risks and outcomes; 3) compiling and organizing information to guide decision making, education, and marketing efforts, and to facilitate the development of a strategic plan; 4) engaging community members about the future of health care delivery; and 5) allowing the charitable hospital to meet federal regulation requirements of the Affordable Care Act, with required not-for-profit hospital to complete a community health needs assessment at least every three years.

### CHI LakeWood Health

### Mission

"The mission of CHI LakeWood Health and Catholic Health Initiatives is to nurture the healing ministry of the Church, supported by education and research. Fidelity to the Gospel urges us to emphasize human dignity and social justice as we create healthier communities."

CHI LakeWood Health is a 15-bed critical access hospital. CHI LakeWood Health employs approximately 150 people and is the largest employer in Lake of the Woods County. The overall economic impact is estimated at \$18.3 million. LakeWood Health Center is one of 103 hospitals that are part of Catholic Health Initiatives operating in 18 states nationwide. This includes four academic health centers and major teaching hospitals as well as 30 critical access facilities; community health-services organizations; accredited nursing colleges; home health agencies; living communities; and other services that span the inpatient and outpatient continuum of care. CHI ranks as the nation's second-largest non-profit health system.

### History

CHI LakeWood Health opened in March 1950 as "Baudette Community Hospital." It was owned by the community and operated by the Sisters of St. Joseph, Crookston, Minnesota. The hospital was leased to the Sisters of St. Joseph in 1954 and in 1957 the Sisters purchased the hospital and changed the name to "Trinity Hospital".

In 1982, the Sisters of St. Joseph entered into a management contract with United Health Resources of Grand Forks, North Dakota until they sold the hospital to Franciscan Sisters Health Care, Incorporated in 1985. During this time, Trinity Hospital took over management of the Pioneer Nursing Home, the long-term term care facility located one mile east of the hospital. In 1986, the hospital acquired the county-owned public health service. Trinity Hospital bought the Pioneer Nursing Home in 1990 and the name was changed to "LakeWood Health Center" to reflect the coming together of acute care, long-term care (LakeWood Care Center), and home health/public health (LakeWood Nursing Service) under one umbrella.

Catholic Health Corporation of Omaha, Nebraska took over sponsorship of LakeWood Health Center in 1993. Two years later they merged with two other large Catholic health care systems to form Catholic Health Initiatives (CHI), the current sponsor, based in Englewood, Colorado.

CHI LakeWood Health completed a building and renovation project in 2000 that resulted in all health care services being available on one campus. LakeWood Nursing Service transferred to Catholic Health Initiatives Health Connect At Home. The operation moved off site in June 2010 and the financial operations were separated in December of 2010. Catholic Health Initiatives At Home discontinued home health services in Lake of the Woods County and public health, school nursing, Parker's Arc transferred back to CHI LakeWood Health in July of 2012. CHI LakeWood Health is the only hospital, clinic and licensed long term care provider in Lake of the Woods County.

CHI LakeWood Health is committed to the promotion of healthier communities. CHI LakeWood Health is proud of its Catholic heritage and its ability to provide direct and indirect support to the communities it serves. CHI LakeWood Health is included in the Official Catholic Directory as a tax-exempt hospital.

### Health Care Facilities and Other Resources

In addition to the 15-bed critical access hospital, CHI LakeWood Health operates a 40-bed long term care facility (LakeWood Care Center), 10-unit residential assisted living (Parker's Arc), rural health clinic (LakeWood Health Center Clinic), rural health clinic nurse visiting program and public health services (LakeWood Public Health) and the ambulance service (Lake of the Woods Ambulance Service).

CHI LakeWood Health providers include two physicians with a third physician working two weeks out of each month. Recruitment is underway for mid-level providers including nurse practitioners and/or physician assistant. Additionally, outreach specialists offer services in obstetrics/gynecology, orthopedics, podiatry and general surgery.

CHI LakeWood Health has recently increased access to tele-medicine services with providers based out of Altru-Grand Forks, ND and Sanford Medical Center-Bemidji, MN. Specialties include wound care, internal medicine, infectious disease, oncology/hematology, psychiatry, gastroenterology, dermatology, endocrinology and rheumatology.

CHI LakeWood Health is located in Baudette, a rural and isolated area of Northern Minnesota serving Lake of the Woods County and surrounding counties of Roseau, Koochiching, Beltrami and on occasion residents of Canada. Baudette, the county seat is situated approximately 330 miles northwest of Minneapolis/St. Paul. Lake of the Woods County also includes the Northwest angle, the northern most point of the lower 48 states. Closest neighboring cities with hospital access include Roseau at 58 miles to the west, International Falls at 69 miles to the east, Bemidji at 102 miles to the south. Lake of the Woods County borders Canada to the north.

Baudette Dental provides comprehensive dental care services for family care and general dentistry services. New patients are welcome. The office is open four days per week.


There is one school district in the county, ISD #390, Lake of the Woods Public School providing curriculum for students K-12 and includes a variety of sports, music and theater. Enrollment for the 2015-2016 school year was 458 students (K-12). Preschool and early childhood programs are also housed at Lake of the Woods School. Adult education programs including GED classes are offered. The school maintains a heated indoor swimming pool and indoor walking track available for public use.

The electrical line worker program from Minnesota State Community and Technical College (Wadena, MN) established a partnership with North Star Electric Cooperative. This brings in a new cohort of students each fall.

The community has a movie theater, six-lane bowling alley, a senior citizen center, eighteen hole golf course, hockey/curling rinks, city library and a new twenty-acre city park along the Rainy River that includes picnic shelter, playground, public boat landing, camping, sand volleyball, ball fields, walking track and skate park. The airport has been expanded in recent years. A new walking and bike trail from the city to the school has been completed and provides a safe route off of the busy highway. Tourism is a large part of local business as the area is known for hunting and fishing in both winter and summer months as well recreational area for snowmobiling and ATVs (all terrain vehicles). There is 65,000 miles of shoreline and several different boat landings along the Rainy River to enjoy and a number of resorts that will rent boats and equipment. There is also a local shooting range just outside of town that is utilized for teaching gun safety for youth. Zipple State Park is located in Lake of the Woods County.

### Assessment Methodology

CHI LakeWood Health primarily serves Lake of the Woods
County and areas immediately adjacent to the county border.
This service area is defined based on the location of the
medical facilities, the geographic distance to other hospitals
and the history of use by consumers. Located in the hospital's
service area are the communities of Baudette (population 1,059
in 2014), Williams (191 population in 2010) Angle Inlet a census-designated place, unincorporated community
(population 60 in 2010) and Birchdale (an unincorporated
community in Koochiching County 26 miles east of Baudette).



A community group consisting of nearly 60 community members was convened and met in a single session on September 24, 2015. The session was held at 5:00 p.m. at First Lutheran Church, Baudette, MN and a complimentary evening meal was served to all in attendance. Demographic information of individuals attending was collected in a private manner and separated from the registration area. (See Appendix A) Members of the community group represented the broad interests of the community served by CHI Lake Wood Health. Invitations were sent to organizations representing the school district, county social services, occupational and development office, ministerium, city and county government, local business owners and health care workers/leaders and the public health director. The meeting was announced on the local radio station and posted in the local newspapers. The session was facilitated by Ms. Jody Horntvedt, Extension Educator, University of Minnesota. An overview of the past community health needs assessment was provided along with the objectives for the evening. The forum objectives were to: 1) Collect quantitative and qualitative information for the Lake of the Woods Community Health Needs Assessment and 2) Demonstrate proactive healthy community interaction and identification of community needs. The assessment included areas of health, safety-violence prevention, nutrition, physical activity, and quality of life. (See Appendix B)

Ten tables were set up with 4 – 6 participants at each table. Each table was labeled with a general topic with worksheets listing the problems and concerns generated at the 2012 forum. Space was also provided on each worksheet to add new items. Two rounds were held allowing participants to choose two areas of interest or expertise. A leader was assigned at each table to record participant comments and the level of importance for each item. Each participant voted high, moderate or low on the importance and this could be done verbally or by hand signal to give everyone the opportunity for input and full participation. At the conclusion of each round, each table selected five priorities and ranked them 1 to 5. (1 most important). Each table reported out their findings by writing the problem or concern on a letter size sheet of paper and these were posted on the wall under the various broad categories for the whole group to view. The facilitator provided a time of conversation, observations and concerns that have a common thread. All of the individual notes were collected to review any comments and note any listing of resources needed or resources that are currently in place. This process was not intended to be scientific or statistically valid. It was designed to collect

qualitative data and quantitative data from the community – specifically related to community perceived health needs and what resources are needed.

### Secondary Data

Secondary data was collected and analyzed to provide a snapshot of the area's overall health conditions, risk, and outcomes. Information was collected from a variety of sources including the U.S. Census Bureau; the Minnesota Department of Health; the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's County Health Rankings, the Annie E. Casey Foundation, KIDS COUNT Data Center.

### Demographic Information

The following table summarizes general demographic and geographic data about Lake of the Woods County.

The data indicates that Lake of the Woods County population is declining with a higher median age than the state median age. The percentage of population over age 65 is also above the state average. This likely signifies an increased need for medical care in the service area due to an aging population. The population age 65 and over in Lake of the Woods County is

projected to be over 31% in 2035. Children living in poverty is above the state average at 18 to 19%. Fifty-five percent of Lake of the Woods School elementary population and 53% of the secondary student population qualified for free or reduced price lunches in the fall of 2015. The median household income in Lake of the Woods County is well below the state average. Lake of the Woods County is a rural and isolated area with 3.0 persons per square mile. Transportation can be an issue for rural residents and isolation can also have effects on health status.

### Health Conditions, Indicators and Outcomes

As noted, several sources were reviewed to inform this assessment including the following::

- 1) 2016 County Health Rankings Minnesota 2) Public Health Profiles
- 3) Kids County Data Book, State Trends in Child Well-Being, July 2015. Of interest, the Gallup-Healthways Well-Being Index (WBI), shows that Minnesota ranked seventh nationally in well-being during 2015 and has ranked in the top ten states in the nation since 2012. The index is an average of six sub-indexes; life evaluation, emotional health, physical health, healthy behavior, work environment, basic access.

### County Health Rankings (http://www.countyhealthrankings.org)

The 2016 County Health Rankings report ranks Minnesota counties according to their summary measures of health outcomes and health factors. Counties also receive a rank for mortality, morbidity, health behaviors, clinical care, social and economic factors and the physical environment. Lake of the Woods County ranks 7 of 87 in health outcomes (improved from 19 of 87 in 2013) and 53 of 87 in health factors (improved from 65 of 87 in 2013). (See Table 2) (See Appendix D for 2016 County Health Rankings Minnesota).

For some of the measures included in the rankings, the County Health Rankings list the "Top U.S. Performers". "The Top Performer number marks the point at which only 10% of counties in the nation do better. The 90th percentile or 10th percentile, depending on whether the measure is framed positively (high school graduation) or negatively (adult smoking)." The variables listed in red are areas where the ranking tool highlights potential challenges the community may want to examine more closely.

### Public Health Community Health Profile

Minnesota Department of Health's 2015 community health profile for Lake of the Wood's County is available at <a href="http://www.health.state.mn.us/divs/chs/countytables/">http://www.health.state.mn.us/divs/chs/countytables/</a>. The Minnesota County Health Tables are a compilation of public health data for Minnesota and its 87 counties. The County Tables are published yearly. Heart disease followed by cancer were the leading causes of death in 2014. Three deaths by suicide also noted. (2014) (See Table 3).

### **Economics**

Lake of the Woods is a low income, isolated community. Persons of all ages living at or below 200% of poverty for Lake of the Woods County was 30.4% compared to 27.1% in Minnesota. (2010 – 2014 American Community Survey Census).

In early 2000, the largest employer in Lake of the Woods County was Solvay Pharmaceuticals. The company was sold to ANI Pharmaceuticals in 2007 and there were approximately 50 employees remaining at the Baudette location. Younger professionals with families left the area changing the income levels for the community, decreasing the number of children enrolled in the local school and decreased the percentage of people in the county with college education. ANI Pharmaceuticals completed a reverse merger in June 2013 with Illinois-based BioSante Pharmaceuticals Inc. At the end of 2014, ANI Pharmaceuticals recorded over 90 employees and growth continues at the Baudette manufacturing site.

The economy of Lake of the Woods County is heavily based in tourism, primarily the resort industry. There are approximately 50 resorts in the county. These resorts, bars, restaurants and liquor stores employ a large number of people and many are parents of school aged children. The resorts also offer work to youth. The work is often seasonal, includes odd hours and shift work. There are usually no health insurance benefits offered for this part time work.

The unemployment rate (2015) for Lake of the Woods County is 4.7% compared to 4.1% in the State of Minnesota. (U.S. Department of Labor statistics). The unemployment rate for Lake of the Woods County ranged between 3.5% to 5.5% from January 2014 to May 2016 and 3.0% to 5.5% in the State of Minnesota. (MN Employment and Economic Development).

### Education

Percent of population aged 25 years and older with less than or equal to high school education or equivalent (i.e. GED) is 51.9% compared to 34.1% in the State of Minnesota. (Demographics Table 6: Selected Minnesota Socioeconomic Statistics by State & County 2010-2014 American Community Survey/Census). The four year drop out rate for Lake of the Woods 2008-2011 is 2.1%-3.6% compared to 5.8%-5.1% for the State of Minnesota. (KIDS COUNT Data Center 2008-2011). Lake of the Woods Secondary School received the 2016 US News and World Report "Silver Award." Schools are ranked based on their performance on state-required tests and how well they prepare students for college. "Lake of the Woods Secondary is ranked 39th within Minnesota. Students have the opportunity to take Advanced Placement® course work and exams. The AP® participation rate at Lake of the Woods Secondary is 64 percent." (Total minority enrollment is 11 percent.)

### Nutrition

For some households, financial stressors put healthy foods out of reach. For others living in remote areas of the county, getting access to groceries that include healthy options requires money for transportation. Lake of the Woods County ranked at 15% indicating the population does not have easy access to healthy foods. <sup>2</sup> The local food shelf distributes food one day per month with availability for emergencies. The local school district identified children who are hungry on return to school after weekends and initiated a food backpack program. The City of Baudette does have one full grocery store offering a meat department, produce aisle, deli and bakery. The grocery store in the City of Williams has a new owner. A new store was built on the property, attached to the existing gas station and vehicle repair business. A Farmer's Market was established in the summer of 2012 and they have had four successful seasons. The community gardens sponsored by CHI LakeWood and State Health Improvement plan started in 2010 and continue to be successful. The garden plots have expanded each year. The cost of groceries has been listed as a barrier in Lake of the Woods County. Meals on Wheels and senior congregate dining continues at the Brink Senior Center, Monday through Friday. The program is sponsored by Lutheran Social Services along with

volunteers and donations from the community. Meal counts are declining making it difficult to keep the program viable.

### Mental Health

Poor mental health days noted at 2.8 in Lake of the Woods County compared to 2.9 in Minnesota and 2.9 in top US performer. Three suicides noted for Lake of the Woods County in 2014 and this is significant for this community. (see Table 3: Ten Leading Causes of Death in Minnesota and Lake of the Woods County, 2014 MN County Health, (www.health.state.mn.us/healthymnpartnership).

Mental health services and provider access have recently changed in Lake of the Woods County in the social service office. Lake of the Woods School has two full time social workers on staff each school year. Counseling services through Behavioral Health at CHI LakeWood continue by contracted services with LifeCare Medical Center, Roseau, MN. Availability of counselors and appointments are limited as reported by those making referrals and those trying to seek services. There are times the behavioral health services are not able to keep up to the referrals and appointments are generally scheduled out 3 – 4 weeks for new patients. Crisis situations are referred for service out of the county. CHI LakeWood Health has recently improved access to psychiatrists through tele-medicine. This has been helpful for medication management and follow up appointments as well as timely consultation for inpatient and emergency room patients. The Minnesota Department of Health Data Injury Access System reports nine incidents of self-directed violence in Lake of the Woods County that required hospital care during 2014. Five of the nine were between ages 15 – 29 and four were between ages 40 – 60.

### Substance Abuse

### Smoking

Lake of the Woods County and State of Minnesota both rank 16% on adult smoking. The national Top U.S. performer ranks at 14%. Freedom From Smoking classes are offered intermittently through the Cardiac/Pulmonary Rehab department at CHI LakeWood Health. The local State Health Improvement Program (SHIP) is working with local housing units to eliminate tobacco use and second hand smoke with a goal of smoke free apartments in 2016. The SHIP group has also been conducting point of sale training and audits in Lake of the Woods County.

### Alcohol Use

Excessive drinking for Lake of the Woods County on 2016 County Health Rankings is ranked 19% however Minnesota ranks higher at 21% compared to the Top U.S. performer ranking of 12%. Local law enforcement reports alcohol and other substances are often involved when they are called in to assist. (Bar fights, domestic disturbances, driving while intoxicated). Alcohol consequences show that from 2005 to 2009 the arrest rate with Lake of the Woods as the county of residence averaged 87.2 per 10,000 population. Arrests in Lake of the Woods as "the county of arrest" the average rate was 133.9 per 10,000 population. (Office of Traffic Safety). This indicates that a number of the arrests were for individuals visiting the county and may be indicative of the number of tourists that vacation in the area. In 2010 - 2014 there were 190 DWI's in Lake of the Woods County. There were no alcohol related motor vehicle deaths. In 2014 there are 39 recorded DWI's. (Source: MN Department of Public Safety)

### Illegal Substance Use

There were seven Lake of the Woods County narcotics arrests in 2009 – three of which involved marijuana. (Bureau of Criminal Apprehension). From 2005-2009 the average annual rate of adults on probation for drug offenses in Lake of the Woods County was 9.4% per 10,000 population: no juveniles were on probation during that period. The rate of adults in prison for drug offenses averages 3.4 per 10,000 population during that same period. Lake of the Woods County Sheriff states substance abuse is a concern and close proximity to the Canadian – U.S. border is a concern for substances coming into the area. Prescription drug abuse is a growing concern.

### Community Concerns and Health Needs Identified

The community needs were identified in five categories: Health, Safety, Nutrition, Physical Activity and Quality of Life (See list of Issues and Priorities) Appendix F.

Health issues listed included hospice and home care shortage with closure of these services in July 2012 of CHI Connect at Home. The Rural Health Clinic Visiting Nurse Program is available but this program does not address hospice services or non skilled care needs. This was the number one concern voiced and ranked high after discussion. At the time of the community forum, the clinic was staffed with two family nurse practitioners and two physicians. In 2014 the Minnesota Nurses Association was voted to represent about half of the CHI LakeWood Employees. Nurses left the organization for a variety of reasons and traveler staff was utilized to cover shifts. The concerns by some for recruitment and retaining of nursing staff are reflected in the data collection. The number of ambulance EMTs has also declined with fewer available for calls. Recruitment and training plans were underway at the time along with recruitment of a new department head for the ambulance. Specialty services are requested by the community and specialty services that are available are well utilized with full appointments and for the most part meeting the needs. There are plans to add specialty services by tele-health through collaboration with Altru Health System in Grand Forks, ND and Sanford Health in Bemidji, MN. Alcohol and drug use/abuse was listed with wait time for treatment programs too long. CHI LakeWood Behavioral Health has two providers, each working one day each week. The need exceeds the capacity and this has caused a backlog in scheduling appointments for both new evaluations and returning patients. LifeCare is working on hiring another therapist with a goal to have services available four days per week. Medication management and the distance to a psychiatrist is a noted gap for our rural area. CHI LakeWood Health is working on tele-health for psychiatric services and recently received access to a psychiatrist consult for emergency room patients and in-patients via telehealth services. Cancer, diabetes and heart-related issues were listed as medical conditions of concern. Common conditions listed for the group attending the forum were arthritis, allergies, back pain, diabetes, high blood pressure, overweight, anxiety, and high cholesterol. Transportation issues were voiced related to limited hours of van service. Paul Bunyan Transit has taken over the transportation system utilizing dispatch out of the Bemidji site. The issue was not as pressing at this time but transportation and limited hours of service along with no weekend or holiday hours is noted. Transportation also comes up under safety and driving under the influence. There are no cabs or ride services available for hire.

Top safety issues listed included drug and alcohol abuse and driving under the influence. The community felt education and awareness with a focus on youth was a needed resource along with enforcement of existing laws and ordinances. The Lake of the Woods Prevention Coalition was listed as a strong resource for our community. A new concern listed for the community is the practice of texting and driving/distracted driving. Safety concerns regarding the lake and large number of tourists who come to enjoy this natural resource. Safety on the ice during winter fishing as well as the warmer weather seasons on the lake were noted. Quick weather changes along with consumption of alcohol add to the risks. Railroad crossings and the cargo that is being transported through the county and City of Williams and City of Baudette comes to the surface on this assessment. Emergency Management through the county, city and health center do have plans in place.

The most prevalent concern for violence in Lake of the Woods County was listed as domestic violence followed by suicide and bullying. There is a coalition meeting regularly for suicide prevention and awareness. This coalition was established in August of 2014 following death by suicides that occurred in our community.

Nutritional concerns listed the cost of healthy foods as a top concern along with the availability of fresh fruits and vegetables. Also included in this category were limited access to senior meals and obesity. The resources identified as needs included more grocery store options, nutrition and cooking education along with more fresh fruits and vegetables available at school and work places.

Physical activity concerns were identified related to facility access, transportation issues and increasing sedentary lifestyles related to technology and electronics. Free access and more access to school facility, parental role modeling of athletic activities, health coaches, bike trails, decreasing sports costs to students, work site wellness programs, were ideas listed as potential resource needs for the community.

Quality of life is affected by poverty, high cost of food, depression/mental health issues, addictions and isolation. Resources that could assist include access to higher paying jobs, job opportunities for youth and young adults, transportation, and more time for family events/family time and support services that allow for care at home and support to stay in the community for those with special needs.

### Priority Health Needs and Summary

The community health needs were identified by those participating in the community forum held in September 2012 and September 2015. Along with the secondary data, the health needs were prioritized by CHI LakeWood Health Interim President, VP of Patient Services, Mission Director, Social Service Director, Director of Marketing and Public Relations, Public Health Director and Lake of the Woods County Social Service Director on April 20, 2016. The four areas of need were reviewed and approved as priorities by CHI LakeWood Health Board of Directors on May 2, 2016.

- Nutrition, Physical Activity Obesity (Cardiovascular Wellness)
- Elderly Services to include community support and quality housing to allow residents to stay at home with services (Home care/Hospice/End of Life Care)
- Mental Health Services
- Drug and Alcohol Abuse

The Implementation Strategy will be developed and approved by the CHI LakeWood Health Board of Directors in advance of November 15, 2016.

CHI LakeWood Health has been involved in community health collaboration over the years and has a history of sponsoring community forums to assess area health issues and needs. CHI LakeWood Health continues a deep commitment and involvement in community health activities working with the community to set priorities and plan for health improvement in Lake of the Woods County. We are grateful to the citizens, health care professionals and community leaders for their thoughtful input for the assessment.

### Summary Community Health Needs Addressed For CHNA completed June 2013

### Home Care and Hospice Shortage – (Lack of Services in Area)

- Explored partnering with CHI St. Joseph Hospital in Park Rapids, MN to provide oversight and leadership for satellite hospice program in Lake of the Woods County. Due to low client census numbers in history of the program, not a viable option at this time.
- Explored a volunteer based hospice program and contacted Kittson County Hospice, Inc. for information on the model of their program.
- Collaborated with Lake of the Woods County Social Services to obtain coverage from LifeCare Medical Center, Roseau, MN (west end of county) and Good Samaritan Society, International Falls, MN (east end of service area/county) for Home Care. Not able to obtain coverage for hospice services.
- CHI LakeWood Health provides respite care and end of life care at care center and health center.
- Patient rooms at the health center were remodeled and furnished to accommodate the comfort of family/friends who want to stay in the room with the patient. Two private rooms have been completed along with a third double room.
- Planning and fundraising is underway to expand and remodel the family room at the health center.
- Rural Health Clinic Nurse Visiting Program was approved in August 2012 and continues. The program grew in number of visits initially with decline in number of visits at end of 2015 comparing to 2014. There is opportunity to market and grow this service. Some of these clients received end of life care in the home.

### Nutrition, Physical Activity and Obesity – (Cardiovascular Wellness)

- CHI LakeWood Health continues to coordinate and sponsor the community gardens which are located on the LakeWood campus. Twenty-seven garden spots were prepared with twenty six taken by community members in 2015. CHI LakeWood assists by tilling, fertilizing, hauling garden refuse and providing a gift certificate for plants or seeds to get started.
- CHI LakeWood continues to sponsor the Diabetic Resource Center which includes program "I Can Prevent Diabetes', a maintenance class and a quarterly diabetes support group open to the public.
- CHI LakeWood Health partnered with LakeWood Regional Healthcare Foundation and local farmer's markets to develop and sponsor a "Fruit and Veggie Prescription Program." Utilizing the Diabetic Resource Program and Cardiac Rehab staff to identify participants who could benefit from improved access to fruits and vegetables. Screening was provided before and after the program. Twenty one participants of thirty four completed the program and showed improvement in three of the five markers. Vouchers are provided for the participant (the number of vouchers provided included the family members) to purchase fresh fruit and vegetables at local farmer's market. This program was renewed for summer of 2016.

- Continue to support the Body Works exercise center at the Health Center with access 24 hours per day with minimal fees for the public. The American Legion in Baudette sponsors 80 individuals each year to assist with New Year's resolution for exercise and choices for healthier lifestyle.
- CHI LakeWood Health provides staff and supplies for health fairs at public events and screening events for local employers upon request.
- Employee wellness activities continue with education, activity challenges, healthy snack options to sample, sharing healthy recipes along with promotion of activity on off time and sign out of equipment. Program and ideas are shared with other groups and employers on request.
- Continue to participate in Statewide Health Improvement Program.

**Transportation** – (primarily elders and handicapped for appointments, work and recreation) CHI LakeWood Health participated on the board of FAR NORTH van service in the past advocating for Lake of the Woods County and residents. The service has since been taken over by Paul Bunyan Transit, Bemidji, MN. The service has expanded its route and does have out of town trips scheduled. CHI LakeWood Health promotes use of the service and utilizes the service for resident activities and outings. There continues to be limited access on weekends and evenings. The service can be hired for special events at rate of \$60 per hour. Most patients who need a ride out of town for medical appointments utilize Lake of the Woods County Social Services, volunteer drivers or friends and family. Transportation services did not come up as a priority during the September 2015 community forum


### WHAT ARE THE COUNTY HEALTH RANKINGS?






